Pioneer Village Weather

A personal weather station at Lot 57 provides local weather information. It is the only weather station in Pleasant Valley (our little valley where Greasy Creek flows down to the Marys River). You can access current and past data at www.wunderground.com. Look for PVHA57 or if that doesn't show up, search for KORPHILO16.

Please note that the wind direction has been problematic, and seems to show winds from the north all night long. That is due to a flaw in the anemometer which we are working on correcting. Consequently, wind direction and wind speed have been off-line for about a week. A new instrument will be installed soon, and wind direction/speed will be back on line. (posted 9/28/17)

Firewise

Thank you for another successful (i.e., uneventful) fire season. A significant amount of brush clearing, grass mowing, and roof cleaning took place which helps provide defensible space and less burning material around our homes. One home replaced old, flammable cedar shingles with a metal roof, further reducing fire risk. Brush Chipping

Brush chipping will occur the first week of May. Please have all your brush on the pile by the school bus turnaround no later than <u>April 30</u>. Please put brush on top of or to the right of the pile. Oregon Department of Forestry will do the chipping for free, as part of their fire prevention work. They ask that all branches are <u>less than 6" diameter</u> and that you <u>DO NOT</u> put the following on the pile:

- poison oak
- blackberry
- scotch broom
- nails or any other metal
- painted or pressure treated lumber
- construction debris

Road Repairs

If it's Spring, it must be road repair season! ED Hughes is busy filling potholes and will be present over the next several weeks to grade the roads and regravel sections, as needed. CPI (Electricity)

CPI has been working in the Village for the past several weeks to reduce problems causing electrical interruptions. Apparently, Pioneer Village has had more than the acceptable amount of such problems during the past 5 years, so CPI has determined that repairs are needed. They are

injecting a fluid material into the underground electrical conduits that will harden and then conduct electricity the same way as copper wires. This automatically repairs breaks or small areas where the wires were frayed. Please be on the look-out for CPI trucks as you drive on the road, as they frequently are stopped by the main junction boxes. (posted 3/23/17)

Greasy Creek update

The Marys River Watershed Council has completed clearing brush and planting trees along Greasy Creek next to the PVHA field. You will see wire cages with little seedlings inside (conifers such as spruce and fir, as well as some hardwoods). The wire cages are meant to keep the deer from eating the trees as they grow. Hopefully, enough of the trees will survive and grow up to shade the Creek. The shade will cool the water and make better habitat for the native cutthroat trout.
