Native Plant Restoration

Work is underway at the north end of the field to restore the vegetation on the slope that was nearly denuded by the gophers this summer. Instead of simply reseeding with grass, the area is being prepped and will be seeded with a mix of seeds native to Willamette Valley prairies. This includes some grasses and lots (and lots!) of different species of wildflowers. The intent is to attract more butterflies and other pollinators back to our little valley (known as "Pleasant Valley"). The area is signed and circled with "Caution" tape to keep kids and pets out while the herbicide dries. It will be safe again by Sunday (Oct 18) but please try to stay off the area so the new seeds are not disturbed. They will overwinter and sprout in early spring, with different flowers blooming at different times throughout the spring and summer. Please enjoy and thank you for your help restoring a piece of our corner of the world.

We are FIREWISE!

Congratulations! We received 20 Firewise completion forms this year (up from 7 for last year) for a total of 654.5 hours worked. This does not include the two days that Riley spent mowing the field or time spent by some doing weed-whacking along roads. This is a truly awesome effort by the Village to be more Fire-Wise. Our certification form has been submitted; we have met all requirements and will be a Certified Firewise Community for 2021. Thanks to all of your for efforts on behalf of the entire Village!

A reminder to clean your fireplace/firestove/pellet stove flu if you haven't already! Cool weather is just around the corner, so make sure you are safe from flu fire surprises!

The awful wildfires in the western Cascade foothills in September are a strong reminder to all of us who live in the forest that we must remain vigilant and careful! Thinning trees on your property, keeping the forest floor clear, and following recommendations for tree limbing and removal of flammable material from next to your house will reduce fire risk. Be mindful of open fires, cigarettes, and anything that might cause a spark. Be sure to call the fire hotline at the Philomath Fire Department (541-360-0030) before doing any backyard burning.

Extreme Heat Warning Sept 7-9, 2020

Oregon Dept of Forestry has issued an Extreme Heat Warming beginning Monday (Sept. 7) afternoon and extending into Wednesday (Sept. 9) morning. The Relative Humidity (RH) will be below 30% and there will be strong east winds. Coming at the end of our summer dry season, this will mean that the forest is very (very!!) dry and easily ignited. PLEASE HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES. During an Extreme Heat Event such as this, no power tools or machinery (or BBQs) are allowed to be used in forested areas. We are all in this together, so please do your part to help out.

Planned Gopher Control Activities

Friday afternoon (7/24), Good Earth Pest Control will be conducting gopher control activities at the north end of the common area field. Most of the work will occur on the sloped area north of the playground (adjacent to Lot 57) but will extend to a couple of spots along the walking path. Good Earth will arrive between 1PM - 3PM and will be active for a couple of hours. The method of pest control employed is safe for people and pets. Good Earth uses a gasoline powered machine called a GopherX to inject carbon monoxide directly into the gopher

For those who walk the path, you need not alter your routine. Just give the pest control technician space and proceed with your normal activities. If you have any questions, call Robert (Lot 57) at 425 295-4130 or just stop by.

Outbreak of Gophers

Did you know that gophers can carry the plague?! The plague bacterium (*Yersinia pestis*) is passed from host-to-host by flea bites. The fleas on the gophers can bite your dog...or you! Dogs don't get sick with the plague, but their fleas can jump onto you and make you sick. Gophers also can carry rabies and hantavirus, but you have to catch the gopher and get bit by it to get these diseases.

Why is this important? Gophers live in the community field and have been seen digging their burrows around the north end. This year is a banner year for gophers, and their populations are exploding though out the Valley. The gophers are working their way up the sides of the field into people's yards. Because they eat plant roots, they are a real pest in vegetable and flower gardens. Professional pest control folks from Good Earth have assessed the situation and are helping with control measures. PLEASE pay attention to signs and stay away from areas when the gopher control is in process. NO poisons will be used, so you, your dogs, and your kids will be safe if you pay attention. Thanks!

Report Your Firewise USA Projects

To remain certified as a Firewise USA community, we are required to certify that we have done fire mitigation work each year. This includes brush removal/thinning, tree limbing, cleaning gutters, cleaning the flue for your fireplace or wood/pellet stove, mowing the grass around your house, and other similar projects. To help you keep track of what you are doing this year, there are forms available at the whiteboard by the mailboxes, or click here to download a pdf. Please return the form to the PVHA mailbox no latter than October 1. We need to certify that we have (collectively) spent the equivalent of 1 hour of work per household (that's about 55 hours total for the Village). Please reach out an help you neighbor as well. We all benefit from a Firewise community!

Saturday (2/15) morning at 10AM down at the bus stop, Anna will be holding a tree planting introduction and passing out HOA provided seedlings to any neighbors interested in planting the next generation of trees around the community. Since not everyone is available that day please email her before Saturday if you would like for her to reserve some seedlings for you and you are unable to attend Saturday morning.

The seedlings are coast redwoods which are extremely hardy and beautiful trees that are naturally resistant to insects and fungal diseases, and are able to grow up underneath the existing tree canopy.
